ALL AMERICAN SHEEP SHOW JULY 2 - 4

The 17th Annual All American Junior Show was held over the 4th of July weekend in East Lansing, Michigan on the campus of Michigan State University. The Michigan Sheep Breeders and Michigan State University pulled out all the stops in hosting the event for the second time. The 2010 All American had 285 exhibitors from 22 states actually exhibiting 1366 head of the 1546 entered. The numbered shown is up 200 head from the last time we visited Michigan and the barn was filled to the hilt!

The Dorset shows took place on Sunday morning, July 4th with Jeremy Etzler of South Solon, OH judging. The quality of the shows was deep once again with 201 Polled Dorsets and 39 Horned

Dorsets entered. But not only was the quality of the Dorset sheep great, I would just like to brag about the Dorset juniors themselves. They are a great set of kids to work with and very enthusiastic about their sheep. It was a real pleasure being with them all week end at the show. The Dorset breed and their parents can certainly be very proud of them!

The Dorset exhibitors also enjoyed a BBQ lunch on Saturday hosted by the National Junior Dorset Association. National President Troy Longenecker of Annville, PA was on hand to lead an informal meeting of the group. Lunch was hosted by the Passwaters family at their RV with Kaye Betts, Julie Waggoner and Dave Murphy helping out with the cooking and service. CDC President Mike Galleher from Mt. Gilead, OH was also on hand to do a fun breed standard educational activity with the kids. Thank-you to all that helped out!!





My final comment would be to encourage producers to enroll their flock in NSIP. They are merging with LambPlan and should have the merger completed sometime this fall. This is an excellent marketing tool for your breeding stock and with development of the new registry program you will have the option of including performance data generated through NSIP/LambPlan on registration certificates. Lamb prices have been good and I have even heard a projection of even better prices this fall and winter. Lamb price is certainly an excellent reason to use performance data to select rams and replacement ewes for your flock so that you can take better advantage of improved production.

In closing, I would like to wish all of you the best of luck with you fall lambing. And, I hope to see many of you in Louisville for the national shows! *Melanie Barkley, CDC Vice President*



FEATURE ARTICLE

YES, IT IS IMPORTANT TO REGISTER YOUR PUREBRED DORSETS

I know what you are probably thinking; of course a breed secretary is going to say it is important to register your purebred sheep. That she is encouraging breeders to do so she can retain her job and to keep the breed registry afloat financially. And you know what; I can not disagree with your thoughts as they are definitely part of the truth. Yes, job security is good and it would be great to be able to actually balance an operating budget. But there are more important reasons to keep registering your purebred Dorsets.

Numbers of registered Dorset sheep keeps declining and the Dorset breed is not the only livestock breed

that feels this pinch. People often ask why do think this is occurring? Is it due to the declining numbers of people actively raising purebred sheep? Yes. Is it due to the tougher economical times and breeders implementing the "register as you go" policy? Yes. Is it due to the induction of so many new breeds into the purebred American sheep industry? Yes. Do breeders feel it isn't necessary to register their purebred Dorsets unless they go into a show ring or to a purebred sale? Yes. This final reason is the major reason why I believe our numbers are decreasing in the Dorset registry. There are a lot of purebred Dorset sheep out performing in America's sheep

industry in a lot of different types of sheep production systems that are not registered. The Dorset breed holds a strong place in both the purebred and commercial sheep industries because of the breed's attributes that allows enhanced performance in these diverse systems.

Breeders need to realize that when you register your purebred Dorset sheep you are doing many positive things:

1)First and foremost you are maintaining the purebred Dorset bloodlines. Bloodlines that other breeders look for to implement certain traits into their breeding programs. I have come across many circumstances where the registration records were not kept up for one reason or another and then the current owners can not register sheep because those past records were either lost or never completed making their sheep ineligible for registration even though they are purebred animals. Registering your animals does give you a permanent record of your animal's ancestry and prevents losing the integrity of those genetics.

2)It does make your animals more valuable. Registration papers are the documents recognized by government agencies when implementing many assistance programs and government reimbursement programs like the federal scrapie program. Registered animals when killed by predators including domestic dogs are evaluated with a higher value. Producers are also able to sell replacement stock off the farm at higher than the going commercial prices when animals are registered.

3)Registration papers are the legal documents that prove ownership. They are your proof of ownership in the courts and are also used to prove value for insurance purposes. This is why during the registration process breed registries are sticklers on getting the ownership of the animals correct and why animals just can't be switched automatically with in a family. Transfers of ownership have to be done to insure the accuracy of ownership.



4)Registering your Dorset sheep allows breeders to exhibit their livestock in shows to earn premiums to supplement the income of a purebred sheep operation. It also enables one to sell in purebred consignment sales when marketing directly off the farm may be challenging for some breeders.

5) The revenue generated from your registering and transferring ownership of your purebred Dorsets does support your breed registry. National breed registries do more than maintain the registry system. The breed association promotes and markets a breed to the entire sheep industry through promotional booths, websites and commercial

advertising. They implement programs to encourage and support youth activity in a breed ensuring the future of a breed through ewe futurity programs, junior association development, scholarship programs and sponsoring premiums and awards at junior shows. They support adult breeder award programs to encourage excellence and the production of quality livestock like breeder of the year programs and awards at National Shows and Sales. They encourage production traits with in a breed by providing a service link to the Lambplan/NSIP performance program, putting production records on the back of registration papers to encourage accurate record keeping, providing record books and barn sheets for lambing records at no cost enabling producers to be able to select their animals based on true performance data. They provide a network-

ing of communication among breeders via websites, newsletters and internet social networks so breeders can get in touch with each other sharing anything from where to find your next stud ram to successful management tips. It is a breed association's responsibility to provide leadership and advancement in a breed to ensure its future in the American sheep industry. For breed associations this leadership is provided by member board of directors and their hired staff.

Many breeders look at ways to cut costs of their purebred sheep operations and the expense of registering sheep is often the first item to be cut. I maintain that the cost of registration is one of the more reasonable expenses that purebred operations occur as long as it is done in a cost effective manor. Here are some tips for breeders to

follow to save some money on the registration process:

*Become a member of your breed association so you can register all your sheep at member rates.

*Make sure that all sheep purchased are put in the member name so you don't have to pay extra fees to get them in the member name. It also avoids you paying the higher nonmember registration rates on some of your sheep and prevents you from ending up with sheep in more that one ownership name which causes problems at shows.

*Make sure that any sheep you transfer out of the member name for leasing or borrowing purposes, that when you get them back you transfer them back into the member name immediately. This will avoid the higher transferring cost at a later date and the call from the breed association office telling you that they could not register your lambs because you don't own the dam.

*Make sure you do transfers quickly after that dates of sale to avoid the extra transferring costs on older transfers, which in many cases is double the regular rate.

*Register all your ewe lambs and potential breeding ram prospects soon after a given lambing period. It is easier to accurately fill out registration application forms on sheep that were born in the last lambing period instead of waiting several months later, we are human after all. The majority of ewe lambs in a purebred breeding program are going to be either retained or sold as breeding stock anyways.

*Register all your sheep before they are a year of age, as

rates go up for older animals.

* Take advantage of online registration applications, if available, as it can save you some time when you get in the emergency situation causing rush fees and express postage. Online applications get your work to the office quicker and in line to get processed sooner. Putting money on your accounts at the breed association office also expedites the registration process if no credit card option is available for payment.

As a breed secretary, I look forward to registering your sheep and being able to perform this service in the most efficient and cost effective manor for you. Let's keep those Dorset genetics and bloodlines well recorded for the future of the Dorset breed and its breeders, not only in the American sheep industry but the global one as well.



DORSET COMMERCIAL CONNECTION

Are You Producing What Your Market Wants?

I recently attended the Howard Wyman Sheep Leadership School in Columbus, OH and thought this would be a great opportunity to share some of the information presented at the school. One of the main themes at the school was to think like a packer so you would gain a better understanding of the type of lambs they are looking for. During the school we evaluated live lambs, followed them through the harvest process and then evaluated carcass characteristics and yield. We also toured some local farms to learn how they are producing lambs for various markets. Here are a few points to hi-light some of the information learned at the school.

Muscling: Obviously, a meat packer is looking for a well muscled lamb that will hang up a heavily muscled carcass. The leg should be well developed and of course we would like to see a large loin eye. If you handle the loin in a live lamb, you should be looking not just at width across the top, but also loin depth. Research has shown (or just ask Dr. Henry Zerby at Ohio State) that the shape of the loin eye can greatly affect size in square inches. Shallow loins are shaped more like an oval as compared to deep loins that are more round in shape. It was amazing how much larger those rounder shaped eyes were in the lambs we evaluated at the school. Translated into weight for the packer, we saw a 2.45 square inch eye yield a 6.89 lb. loin as compared to a 3.1 square inch eye that yielded a loin that weighed 7.07 lbs. I thought it was also interesting that the lamb with the 2.45 square inch loin eye weighed 158 lbs live, while the lamb with the 3.1 square inch loin eye weighed 132 lbs. To really make this interesting, the calculated carcass value of the heavier (and lighter muscled) lamb was \$232.45 and the carcass value of the other lamb was \$240.10. To us, this looks like a small difference, but across hundreds of lambs a day to a large packer, it becomes very important. It should also make us think a bit harder about the importance of muscling in our lambs.

Amount of Finish: I always find it interesting that while

we shoot for .1 inch of backfat in a carcass contest, this really

isn't enough finish for a packer. This .1 inch of backfat would translate into a 1.4 yield grade and packers prefer yield grades of 2 to 3. This is because the additional fat cover protects the meat from drying out while the carcass is hanging in the cooler. To get a yield grade 2 to 3, a lamb needs .16 to .35 inches of backfat.

Adding Value to a Leg: This is an area that I could see packers doing more of in the future. This would also be an option if you are selling any retail cuts directly to customers. During the school we boned out a leg of lamb and looked at the individual muscles that make up the leg. Many families can't eat an entire leg of lamb at one meal. Plus, with the fast pace of today's lifestyle, roasting a leg is reserved for special occasions such as holiday dinners. By separating muscles, these can be prepared in a variety of ways AND be cooked quickly by grilling. For example, the cuts can be rolled in spices or marinated for additional flavor. Their smaller size also fits the needs of a "typical" family. The bottom round can even be made into an awesome pastrami for cold cut sandwiches. Other cuts we looked at included top round, sirloin, eye of round, and shanks. Dr. Kuber from Ohio State served as head chef for the event and provided participants with recipes for the meals that we ate during the school. Lamb was served in a variety of ways at all meals so that we could have first-hand experience with these recipes. We even ate lamb for breakfast in an omelet.

Producing for Your Market: One day of the school was devoted to tours of local operations. Two of the operations really impressed me in how they meet the needs of their market. One producer is selling lamb and goat to ethnic populations in the Columbus area. Customers come to the farm and pick out the animal they want and can then wait while that animal is harvested and processed to their individual specifications. The other operation that impressed me feeds out about 6,000 lambs a year for cruise ships. These lambs are harvested at 150 to 180 pounds so that they yield a larger lamb chop.

The school really offers a lot of information from production to marketing. If you can clear your schedule, I highly recommend the Leadership School as well as the Lamb 509 course taught by Dr. Zerby. These are well worth the time and are useful for helping you further develop your sheep flock to meet the needs of the meat industry. NSIP AND LAMBPLAN FINALIZE FORMAL AGREEMENT

The skill in breeding sheep for any purpose relies on the ability of the producer to select animals that have superior sets of genes to contribute to the next generation and to cull those that do not. The National Sheep Improvement Program (NSIP) and the Meat & Livestock Australia (MLA) put signatures to an agreement that will make a new system, LAMBPLAN, available to U.S. sheep producers.

"The partnership we are forging with LAMBPLAN and MLA provides sustainability for genetic evaluation services in the United States," commented James Morgan, Ph.D., NSIP chairman. "The U.S. sheep industry has made a large investment in the research needed for genetic evaluation. This partnership will meld the U.S. research with the outstanding service infrastructure of LAMBPLAN. Also, the U.S. sheep industry is looking forward to the collaboration between U.S. and Australian sheep researchers to develop new genetic evaluation tools for the 21st century."

The partnership allows producers to take advantage of LAMBPLAN's human resources, technical ability and advanced software that will allow expected progeny differences (EPD) to be created for more traits. Production traits such as growth rate, fat and muscle depth, wool weight and quality, reproduction and internal parasite resistance can be processed and delivered to the producer within two weeks.

NSIP will maintain active representation to support the needs of U.S. producers. A portal to LAMBPLAN is being developed on the NSIP web site, www.nsip.org. where clients will sign up to participate. Information can be input directly into a producer's computer, sent to LAMBPLAN and EPDs will be returned. Producers will pay a flock fee that will enable them to download and submit data, and will also pay a processing fee on the number of head processed.

Additional information will be available on the NSIP we site as it becomes available. NSIP is currently working on inputting all their past data into the LAMBPLAN system so the previous data recorded in the NSIP system by U.S. producers will be included in future performance evaluations. The Dorset breed has several breeders involved with NSIP and this new partnership with LAMBPLAN will prove to be a great asset for out breeders.

CDC PRODUCTION COMMITTEE MEETING MINUTES - April 28,2010

Melanie Barkley called the meeting to order at 8:00 PM eastern time. Present on the call were Jeff Hunter, Brad Smith, Kathy Soder, and Melanie Barkley

-Performance data to include on registration certificate:

Melanie reviewed the notes from the discussion that she had with Bill Bowman from the American Angus Association on April 12. These notes were as follows: In the late 50's to early 60's the association started collecting performance data. They had a core of folks who believed in the process and this grew over time very slowly. They had about 400,000 registrations per year at this point. The major adoption of data came in the mid-80's, which also corresponded with the low point in their number of registrations. Producers needed cattle that would work on commercial operations. At this point, they saw about a 15% to 20% growth in registration numbers. In recent years the performance data has become much more widely accepted. One mistake they saw was that the registration and the performance data were considered two separate issues in the beginning. At that time they had 2 different certificates. They have now incorporated the data into 1 certificate and EPD's are calculated in-house. They got their start with assistance from Universities. In 2000 they began doing their calculations in-house and in 2007 created Angus Genetics, Inc. which handles all the performance data for the Angus Association as well as for a number of other associations.

Over time, data became the value determinant of genetics. This built more demand on the commercial basis. One of their best marketing tools was the Sire Summary Evaluation. They published the first one in 1974 and sent this out to anybody who bought Angus Bulls. It became a tool to educate as well as a ready source of information on performance pedigrees. They used to print about 100,000 copies a year, but it is now available over the web and they print about 4,000 to 5,000 copies per year on a request basis.

Bill's advice was that we need to get the information into folks hands so they have time to study the information. He also noted that the wide use of artificial insemination helped to drive this process. The consumer focus with Certified Angus Beef program has helped to concentrate production goals on the end product merit. Information they currently incorporate into the data are weights at birth, weaning and yearling. As yearlings, cattle are scanned and the information goes through a centralized ultrasound processing center. (About 160,000 head are scanned each year.) This is overseen by the Ultrasounds Guidelines Council. Technicians are certified to scan livestock and they send their data to the labs for analysis. This allows the data to be more standardized. The data is then send on to the associations to include on registration certificates.

-What data do we want to include?

Frank Tiffany, a past CDC director and the webmaster for the association website, is writing a new registry program for the association. He will be able to include whatever data we would like.

A discussion started with the likelihood that we would not have progeny data on the certificate because certificates are typically requested shortly after a lamb has been weaned. Producers aren't likely to have registry certificates updated after that point. A suggestion was made to be able to store pedigree information electronically so that producers could print off information for an updated certificate. We would need to talk to Frank about this idea. Another option would be to post updated information on the web on a semi-annual basis. Melanie will contact Dave Notter about the possibility of getting information from LambPlan sent to the CDC. The NSIP Office in the U.S. will likely be involved with posting a sire summary on-line. This could be the opportunity for producers to get updated information on rams/ewes that they are selling. Information will likely be able to be sent from LambPlan to the CDC office. Another option would be for each individual producer to send their information to the CDC office using the Pedigree Wizard software provided from LambPlan. This software is currently being adapted to U.S. units of measure ie pounds. Suggested data that we would like to see on the pedigree would be EPD's for birthweight, 60 day weight, and 120 weight (post weaning). Maternal information that the committee would like to include would be milk, milk plus growth, and percent lamb crop. Carcass information would include fat and loin measurement. Lambplan will be using a post weaning fat measurement and an eye muscle depth in mm. One inch is equal to 25 mm, so producers can get a better idea of what this means. These measurements will likely stay in metric because they make more sense than measuring in inches. The fat measurement often has very small increments. Rather than using a percent lamb crop, Lambplan will likely give EPD's for # lambs born and # lambs weaned.

The committee pointed out the need to decide on a standard to use for adjustments. The committee also wondered about the best age to scan. Dave suggested that scanning should be done at 90 to 150 days of age.

-How will we market the idea of collecting performance data?

The committee felt the Association needs to develop a brochure that can be sent out with registration certificates. Another suggestion was to include information on the back of the registration certificate. It might direct producers where to go for more information on performance data. Other marketing efforts could include a series of articles in the Dorset Connection. These article would explain what LambPlan is, the benefits to the producer, and how to enroll in the program. The brochure would help producers to better understand the data reported on a registration certificate.

For more marketing, we might look at ways that we can tie in with NSIP on their marketing efforts. Press releases could be sent to the larger sheep producer media: Sheep, The Shepherd, The Banner. We could also contact ASI to help identify commercial producers. Another option would be to have information available at education events and festivals such as the regional genetics symposium, Sheep and Wool Festivals, State Sheep and Wool Growers Association meetings. *-How will we involve youth in this program?*

Because performance data and testing is something different from the current show program, we are challenged to think of a new and different way to involve youth in this program. Some thoughts by the committee were as follows:

-Evaluation contest

-Information distributed in packets such as at the All American Junior Show

-Youth program at the Center of the Nations Sale

-Data based classes for production type sheep at a show

Melanie mentioned an idea she has about getting youth involved in a feeder to finish 4-H project. Youth would identify their animals by a certain date and then are expected to have them ready to market by a specified date. On that day, all animals would be loaded onto a truck headed to a processing facility. Youth would be paid on a grade and yield basis. -Developing a sale for production type Dorsets

Committee members felt this should be tabled for a few years until we have a sufficient number of producers involved to be able to offer a performance sale. One suggestion was made to get things started by offering a Friday field day followed by a Saturday sale. On Friday, participants would learn more detailed information about performance data and sheep entered in the sale would be scanned that day. Additional information that could be included would be weight and scrotal circumference for rams. A caution on this would be not to focus too much on carcass data. Another possibility would be to start another Center of the Nationals type sale.

~Dorset Excellence Program~

Program is open to ALL breeders of REGISTERED Dorset Sheep. All types of registered sheep i.e. wether type, commercial, traditional or show breeding stock Dorset sheep are eligible. The program will include both Dorset Horns and Polled Dorsets with each competing separately.

The Dorset Excellence Program will be conducted annually from January 1st through December 31st. Each entry submission will be judged strictly on an anonymous basis. At no time will judges know which breeder corresponds with submission materials.

The judging criterion for the program is based upon a guidelines system at the discretion of the judging committee. Each submission will be judged against the Dorset Breed Standard. Entries will not be judged against each other. Winner(s) will be announced the year at appropriate events for th winners.

ENTRY INFORMATION:

Breeders will be asked to fill out a questionnaire, provide several photos of their flock and furnish a short statement about their flock's purposes and goals.

-Submission Requirements: (NO SHOW PICTURES PLEASE)

- 1. Provide a photo of your brood ewe flock or "keeper" females
- 2. Supply 2 pictures ~ Head & Profile of your ideal ewe lamb
- 3. Supply 2 pictures ~ Head & Profile of your ideal brood ewe
- 4. Supply 2 pictures ~ Head & Profile of your ideal ram
- 5. Furnish 1 photo ~ Rear picture of your ideal ram or ewe **Pictures provided must be at least 4" x 4" or up to 8 x 10 inches in size. Either black & white or color photos are acceptable. High clarity/pixel size is best. Photos cannot be returned.NOTE: Pictures MUST show your sheep in natural fleece or slick shorn if you prefer.

No washed, fitted or show pictures accepted.

CDC TO START REGISTERING PUREBRED DORSET WETHERS AS OF JANUARY 1st, 2010

The Continental Dorset Club will start registering purebred Dorset wethers starting January 1, 2010. Dorset wethers showing in CDC sponsored shows willneed to have registrations certificates in 2010. These shows include the six Regional Junior Dorset Shows, the All-American Junior Show, and the NAILE Wether Show. The CDC also sponsors several overall Champion Wether awards across the country at different shows. If the overall breed champion is won by a purebred Dorset they receive an additional \$500-\$250. These lambs will need to be registered to claim their cash award.

The CDC sponsors over \$7250 a year in Dorset junior shows where Dorset wethers are being shown so in order to help maintain this sponsorship the CDC is just asking our wether type producers to register those purebred Dorset wethers to help support these shows. Breeders ask why should they have to register a nonreproducing animal? These Dorset wethers are being shown for premiums in shows, earning money and representing the Dorset breed like any other show animal. It is important to keep those winning Dorset genetics officially recorded and recognized for future generations of sheep producers.

For open show exhibitors: In addition to sending in your entries and entry fees to the NAILE when entering the show, please don't forget to send in the matching \$10.00 per individual entry in the Open Polled and Horned Dorset shows directly to the CDC Office. This enables the CDC to provide matching funds and to guarantee at least \$10.00 per individual entry in premiums. These matching funds need to be sent to the CDC office ASAP if you haven't done so yet. They need to be paid prior to the show. Please note that junior show sheep do not have to send in matching funds unless they are staying on to be shown in the open shows.

2010 DORSET EWE FUTURITY UPDATE

The Dorset Ewe Futurity Program has been very active this year with a lot of nominations and point records forms coming into the CDC office. Without your support this successful futurity program would not be possible! A total of \$5050 has been raised to pay out to the participants of the polled and horned ewe lamb divisions. On the back cover of this newsletter is a list of all the nominators! We were fortunate to have five group nominators this year. Riverwood Farms, Superior Farms, Spilde Brothers, Olivia Waggoner and the Cassell Family were group nominators at the 2010 sales.

214 ewe lambs have been nominated this year, 174 polled ewe lambs and 40 horned dorsets. Of those, 64 have been tattooed by their new junior owners for participation in the futurity program. To date the CDC office has received point record forms from 33 of these junior owners. Don't forget that you don't have to show at a regional junior show to be eligible for premiums but exhibitors are still rewarded for attending regional shows as they are awarded double points. These point record forms need to be received in the CDC office within 21 days of the date of the show or they will not count. They also need to be signed by show management. Also, the deadline to send in Regional Point Record forms into the CDC Office is Nov. 8th. This allows the office enough time to tabulate final regional placing before Louisville. Those regional points will carry over to your Louisville junior show placing if you are attending that show to compete for the separate Louisville premiums.

The yearling ewe division tied the record number of 9 yearlings nominated. Keep sending those point record forms in on the yearling ewes. The yearling ewe futurity will also end at the National Junior Dorset Show in Louisville like the ewe lamb program.

All the regional polled and horned ewe lamb winners will be announced and recognized at the National Junior Association Meeting on Saturday, November 13th in Louisville. Immediately after the junior shows on Sunday, November 14th, the final national placings will be announced in the polled ewe lamb, horned ewe lamb and yearling ewe futurities. Awards will be given out along with the breeder plagues.

The futurity points are updated on a regular basis on the CDC website to keep everyone appraised of point totals.

Summer has drawn to a close with the Dorset Breed being well represented in shows and sales all season from coast to coast.


