2011 NAILE SCHEDULE OF EVENTS AND EXHIBITOR INFORMATION

The Dorsets will once again be showcased at the upcoming National Dorset Shows during the North American International Livestock Exposition in Louisville, KY. Following is a schedule of specific Dorset events:

-Lead Classes: Fri., Nov. 11th, 1:00 PM -Junior Market Lamb Showmanship and Junior Breeding Sheep Showmanship: Fri., Nov. 11th, 5:30 pm

-Junior Market Lamb Show: Saturday, Nov. 12th, 8:00 AM.

-National Junior Dorset Association Annual Meeting & Pizza Party: Saturday, Nov. 12th, 7:00 PM

-National Junior Dorset Shows: Sunday, Nov. 13th, 8:00 AM. Horned & Polled Dorsets will be the second & third breeds shown in the North Ring with Rob Zelinsky judging.

-National Open Dorset Shows: Tuesday, Nov. 15th, 8:00 AM, Polleds first followed by Horneds. Bob McCrumb will be judging the Polleds and Steve Myers will be doing the Horneds.

New this year in the Junior and Open Polled Dorset Shows: There will be separate slick sheared and fitted champions selected that will then compete for the overall Champion Polled Rams and Ewes. Also, note that the junior breeding sheep showmanship classes will be late Friday afternoon. The classes will be divided by age and all breeds will show together. This was done in hopes to shorten the junior breeding sheep show on Sunday.

Please make sure you review the special rules in the Dorset section of the premium book for both the open and junior shows as they will be adhered to. For open show exhibitors: In addition to sending in your entries and entry fees to the NAILE when entering the show, please don't forget to send in the matching \$10.00 per individual entry in the Open Polled and Horned Dorset shows directly to the CDC Office. This enables the CDC to provide matching funds and to guarantee at least \$10.00 per individual entry in premiums. These matching funds need to be sent to the CDC office ASAP if you haven't done so yet. They need to be paid prior to the show. Please note that junior show sheep do not have to send in matching funds unless they are staying on to be shown in the open shows.

2011 DORSET EWE FUTURITY UPDATE

The Dorset Ewe Futurity Program has once again been active this year with point records forms coming into the CDC office. A total of \$4100 has been raised to pay out to the participants of the Dorset futurity divisions. Following this article is a is a list of all the nominators. We were fortunate to have three group nominators this year. Riverwood Farms, Olivia Waggoner and the Cassell Family were group nominators at the 2011 sales. Thank-you to all the nominators for supporting this program once again!

155 ewe lambs have been nominated this year, 129 polled ewe lambs and 26 horned dorsets. Of those, 51 have been tattooed by their new junior owners for participation in the futurity program. To date the CDC office has received point record forms from 23 of these junior owners.

Don't forget that you don't have to show at a regional junior show to be eligible for premiums but exhibitors are still rewarded for attending regional shows as they are awarded double points. These point record forms need to be received in the CDC office within 21 days of the date of the show or they will not count. They also need to be signed by show management. Also, the deadline to send in Regional Point Record forms into the CDC Office is Nov. 7th. This allows the office enough time to tabulate final regional placing before Louisville. Those regional points will carry over to your Louisville junior show placing if you are attending that show to compete for the separate Louisville premiums.

The yearling ewe division had 8 yearlings nominated. Keep sending those point record forms in on the yearling ewes. The yearling ewe futurity will also end at the National Junior Dorset Show in Louisville like the ewe lamb program.

All the regional polled ewe lamb winners will be announced and recognized at the National Junior Association Meeting on Saturday, November 12th in Louisville. Immediately after the junior shows on Sunday, November 13th, the final national placings will be announced in the polled ewe lamb, horned ewe lamb and yearling ewe futurities. Rosettes will be given out along with the breeder recognition.

The futurity points are updated on a regular basis on the CDC website to keep everyone appraised of point totals. We do this so you can make sure that the CDC office has received all your point record forms. If you have any questions please feel free to contact the CDC Office.

2011 ANNUAL CDC MEETINGS HIGHLIGHTS

The Annual CDC Board Meeting and Annual CDC Membership Meeting were held late June at the Midwest Sale in Sedalia, Mo. Following are the highlights that came out of those meetings. For a complete and detailed accounting of the meetings please see the minutes posted on the CDC web site at: www.dorsets.homestead.com.

-Treasurers Report: Deb Hopkins presented the financial report for the fiscal 2010-2011 year to date as of June 8, 2011. Total income is \$58,658.27, total expenses is \$67,405,47 for a current net cash loss of \$8,747.20. Account balances: Checking Account: \$11,764.09; Savings Account: \$25.00; CD: \$25,333.60; Money Market: \$10,047.22; Junior Association \$9,069.57 for total cash assets of \$56,239.48. Deb Hopkins also reported that the forms have been filed with the IRS for the fiscal year 2009-2010 by the accountant. A total of \$8,416.16 loss in the cash flow was reported due to the large drop in registrations last year. -CDC Stats: Deb Hopkins presented the 2010-2011 statistics to date. As of May 31, 2011, 3,301 head have been registered and 1,631 head have been transferred. The registrations are up 143 head from the same period last year and the transfers are down 19 head from the same period last year. Deb Hopkins also read the final stats for 2009-2010. There were 6240 head registered (down 971 from last year) and 3157 head transferred (down 388 head from last year). -Correspondence: Deb Hopkins reported hat she had received a letter from Tracy

Repasky's estate that she had left money to the CDC National Junior Dorset Association Scholarship Fund. When further information is received she will notify the boards and write a letter of thanks to the Repasky family.

-Dorset Futurity: Discussions were held on the possibility of doing off farm nominations for the futurity program. After much discussion it was decided not to do anything different to the current futurity program but President Galleher appointed a committee to look into developing a "Breeder Youth Incentive Program" for promoting direct off farms sales to new junior buyers. Johnny Johnson, Casey Sidwell and Coulter Passwaters were appointed to come up with a proposal for the fall board meeting. It was reported that the 2011 Ewe Lamb Futurity, both polled & horned, has had 153 lambs nominated. There have been 8 yearling ewes nominated for the Yearling Ewe Futurity Program. -Breed Standard: It was moved & passed to add Robert McCrumb III and Ryan Hendricks to the certified judges list. -Production Dorset Committee: Melanie Barkley reported on the ideas that the breeders would like to see possibly implemented: 1)Sales page on the website for breeders; 2)Breeders Directory Designation: A new section will be put on the entry blank for Dorset sheep for breeders to classify their type of Dorsets being raised; 3)List of Performance Data for Registration Certificate.

-Dorset Wether Registration: It was brought that many of the major fairs need to have the wording changed in the CDC sponsorship that the wording needs to be changed to "registered" from being "purebred and providing a picture for proof". The directors will contact the major fairs in their areas to make sure this wording gets clarified. Market lambs will need to be registered at the All American and at Louisville to claim the \$250 Dorset Champion and \$150 Dorset Reserve Champion premium.

-Spider DNA Testing: Discussion was held on this issue in the Dorset breed on whether to institute a testing policy and it was decided to address this issue in the future if need be and to encourage breeders to be aware of the spider gene in selection of potential breeding stock. -2012 Annual Meeting & National Sale: After much discussion, it was moved and passed hat the National Dorset Sale be on a four year rotation between Illinois, Reno,

Ohio and Sedalia with the rotation starting in 2012 at Illinois Dorset Sale in April at Bloomington, IL.

-Dorset Hall of Fame: A committee was appointed of Johnnie Johnson and Jeff Poynter to look at a program for a Dorset Hall of Fame of people of importance to the Dorset breed.

-Percentage Registry: A proposal was discussed about doing a percentage registry. After much discussion there was no decision to start one at this time.

-Election of 2011-2012 Officers: Casey Sidwell was elected President and Johnnie Johnson Vice President.

-Budget: It was moved to increase transfers by \$1.00 to help keep the CDC budget balanced.

Proper Handling of Livestock Vaccines

Looking at a group of healthy sheep peacefully grazing while their lambs bounce around the pasture can be a very satisfying experience. However, healthy animals don't just happen, they take time and care. One step to keeping animals healthy involves vaccinating them to protect against disease. In order to accomplish good protection against disease, it is important to handle vaccines properly.

To protect your animals against infectious diseases, it is important to vaccinate not only at the right time, but with the right product. Properly handling the vaccine from the time it is purchased to the time it is given to the animals will ensure the best immunity.

When buying vaccines, purchase from a reputable source who will deliver a high quality vaccine. Most vaccines should be stored in a refrigerator. Heat can make the vaccines ineffective, so they should not be allowed to warm up to room temperature at any time. Also, be sure that the vaccines do not freeze. This could also make them ineffective.

If you buy vaccines that need mixed, use only the rehydrating solution packaged with the vaccine. Determine how many animals you need to vaccinate and only mix enough to vaccinate that number. Any leftover vaccine should be thrown away as it loses its effectiveness during storage. For some vaccines, this could be as quickly as one to two hours after it has been rehydrated. So, only mix what you will use in a very short period of time.

Generally, there are two types of vaccines: modified live and killed. Modified live vaccines have been treated so that the disease viruses will not cause the disease, but will allow the animal to produce immunity to the disease. This occurs when the virus reproduces in the animal's body and the animal's immune system then develops antibodies. These vaccines are generally not safe to give to pregnant animals because the vaccine mimics an infection.



Injections should always be given in the area inside the triangle on the neck of the sheep.

Killed vaccines are made from viruses or bacteria that are no longer active. This type of vaccine stimulates the animal's body to produce antibodies which prevent the animal from getting the disease if the animal is exposed. These vaccines can be given to pregnant animals.

Follow label directions for how to give the injection. Some products call for subcutaneous (SQ) injections which are given under the skin. Other products should be given in the muscle (IM). If you have a choice, it is better to give the injection SQ as this will minimize any damage to muscle tissue. The best area to give the injection is in the neck, or in front of the shoulder.

In addition to the injection site, look for the timing of the vaccinations. Be sure to follow directions for age at administration and if another vaccination needs to be given at a later time period. Younger animals tend to need a second injection two to four weeks later. Then, annual boosters are recommended using a single dose. If the animals receiving the injection will be used for meat, make sure you check the withdrawal times. Most withdrawal times are 21 to 28 days after injection.

Handling vaccines properly will help to ensure that the product will produce immunity against specific diseases within your sheep. And, will help keep those lambs bouncing happily across your pastures.

PA LIVESTOCK EVALUATION CENTER HOLDS 33RD PERFORMANCE TESTED RAM

The exceptional quality of Pennsylvania's sheep and meat goat industries was on display Saturday, Aug. 6, at the Livestock Evaluation Center's 33rd Annual Performance Tested Ram lamb and Meat Goat Buck Sale.

The sale featured 133 animals that included 55 rams and bucks that were selected after 77-day ram and 70-day buck performance tests, which evaluated growth, average daily gain, muscling and fat deposition.

Twenty-nine rams averaged \$631 in the sale, while 40 consignment ewes averaged \$421. The top-selling ram, a Dorset consignment from Campbell Dorsets of Blairsville, PA, was sold to John Waltz, Jr. of Smithburg, MD for \$1,100. Hollystone Farm, Paoli, PA sold a ram for \$1050 to the same buyer and Penn State sold a \$1000 ram to Kenneth Bell, Medina, OH. All three of these rams came out of the Senior Dorset Ram Lamb division. High indexing ram in the Junior Dorset division was from Sunny Valley Farm, Manheim, PA and sold for \$425 to Linda Hetrick of Palmyra, PA. The high selling junior Dorset ram lambs were consigned from John Stewart, Hookstown, PA and Melana Lovell, Linden, PA and sold for \$650 each.

The high selling ram from Campbells was the highest indexing ram in the sale over all breeds. He indexed at 118. His average daily gain on test was 1.10# and his actual loin eye measured 3.9". Congratulations to the Campbells on their high indexing and selling ram!

All rams were sold with growth data, feed efficiency, loin measurements and fat thicknesses, which can be used to help producers make important breeding and sales decisions. Included in the sale were invitational ewes from producers with animals on test. All animals sold in the sale were considered flock or herd improvers.
