2020 UNPREDICTABLE TIMES PROVE DORSET BREEDERS RESILIENCE

Oh, it seems so long ago when we all first heard about COVID 19 back in early March. I had just returned from Louisville from attending the NAILE sheep committee meeting and the Kentucky Beef Expo with my family, when our world took a drastic turn. We all know what happened after that, cancellations of live events, movement to virtual events, pop up of live junior shows in states that were more flexible in their COVID regulations, and reorganization of state junior livestock shows in place of the highly attended state fairs. It was a constantly evolving process and it all depended on where you were and where you lived in this country of ours, if you could take advantage of these special new opportunities.

Bottom line, our summer plans were turned upside down, whether it was the marketing and selling of breeding stock and/or market animals, or showing off hard work and promoting breeding programs at fairs and shows throughout the summer and fall. Financially many of us had to re-evaluate marketing strategies. Many went from live in person sales to off farm/open house sales and more online sales. Sale managements and breed associations offered multiple online selling opportunities for breeders and those who had online sales already in place, increased lot numbers and offered slots to other supporting breeders. Some sales were more successful than others, but all in all it went well for most breeders.

Of course much young stock went directly to the sale barns. That market was also very volatile during the spring and summer depending on location. Speaking for the Northeast it held pretty well during much of the season as there was still demand for lamb, especially in direct marketing venues as grocery stores and many farmers markets remained operational as they were considered a direct food source. Now with many restaurants opening working under reduced seating capacities, that will also help with lamb demand but unfortunately many restaurants will not survive or

can during these times with additional restrictions so, that may affect lamb pricing and demand moving forward.

It will be interesting to see how many Dorset breeders have held over breeding stock to grow out for next year's sales. The demand for breeding animals on a commercial scale has actually increased it seems during this summer as many folks are raising their own food. Just try to buy a freezer or get Mason canning jars in our area! Our year end statistics show that we only had a slight decrease in registrations and transfers overall which bodes well for the future.

We were able to continue with the 2020 Dorset Futurity Program this year because we have the advantage of



our program being based around a regional system and it sets up kids to be able to compete no matter where they live especially in the Polled Dorset Ewe Lamb program. We had tremendous support on the part of the breeders nominating ewe lambs in the spring and were actually able to have some live shows here and there, so point record forms could easily be submitted.

Thanks go out to those who were able to organize live shows in their part of the country!

Thanks to your help and the support of the sponsors, kids were able to attend a live show here and there. The CDC was able to host four live regional junior Dorset shows. We also need to thank all the organizers of the regularly held shows throughout the country who put in numerous hours and efforts to try to keep the show on. I am involved in two very large national shows directly and it was the most heartbreaking process I have been through in quite some time. It was like being on a rollercoaster and having no control. The highs and lows were excruciating, and it got to the point where it just became infeasible to pull them off.

If I have learned something over the years, if you don't have your health you don't have much, and you need

2020 CDC ANNUAL BOARD OF DIRECTORS TELECONFERENCE MEETING MINUTES

The meeting was called to order at 7:37 PM on March 23, 2020 by President Michael Pope. Directors Rachael Gately, Bart Cardwell, Linda Mastin, Dick Reece and Glenn Stunkel were in attendance. North Central Director-Elect Jeremy Crouch was on the call as well as CDC Exec. Sec./Treas. Deb Hopkins.

Secretary Minutes: Deb Hopkins presented in writing the minutes from the Special Board of Directors Tele- Conference Meeting held October 30, 2019 and the 2019 CDC Fall-Teleconference Meeting held December 3, 2019. Rachael Gately moved to accept both sets of minutes as written. Glenn Stunkel seconded. Motion carried.

Treasurer's Report: Deb Hopkins presented the financial report for the fiscal 2019-2020 year to date as of March 11, 2020. Total income is \$33,210.73, total expenses is \$52,2557.36, for a current net cash loss of \$19,044.63. Account balances - Checking Account: \$52,922.25; Savings Account: \$25.00; CD: \$26,321.25; Money Market: \$10,181.83; Junior Association \$27,897.52 for total cash assets of \$117,347.85. Dick Reece moved to accept the treasurer's report. Bart Cardwell seconded. Motion passed. Deb also stated that the CDC had a net income of \$9,026.10 the previous fiscal year and the non-profit taxes have been filed. Deb Hopkins also presented a proposed budget for 2020-2021 for the board to review as it goes through the meeting.

CDC Stats: Deb Hopkins presented the 2019-2020 statistics to date. As of March 16, 2020: 1657 head have been registered and 831 head have been transferred. The registrations are even from the same period last year and the transfers are down 30 head from the same period last year. In the Dorset Advantage registry, 85 head have been registered to date and 115 head have been transferred. The registrations are down 16 head from the same time period last

year and transfers are up 26 head from the same period as last year. Deb also stated that last fiscal year 2018-2019 the CDC registered 5238 head (down 544 head from the previous year) and transferred 2905 head (down 169 head from the previous year). In the Dorset Advantage registry, last year 1314 head were papered (up 637 head from the previous year) and 524 head were transferred (up 142 head from the prior year).

Correspondence: There was none to present at the meeting.

COMMITTEE REPORTS:

-Dorset Futurity: Deb Hopkins reported that the futurity nominations have been doing very well on the online sales. Having breeders allowed to futurity nominate ewe lambs that were entered in the March Ohio Dorset Sale was taken advantage of some breeders that sold their lambs directly. To date there has been 61 polled ewe lambs nominated, 15 horned ewe lambs, 18 Dorset Advantage ewe lambs for a total of 94 ewe lambs. Yearling ewe deadline to be re-nominated has not occurred yet. Of the ewe lambs nominated 43 of them have been bought by junior buyers. Expecting a lot more online sale nomination's coming up. Since, the CDC had moved the 2020 National Dorset Sale to the May Ohio Dorset Sale, Glenn Stunkel moved to handle the ewe lambs entered in that sale to be eligible for direct selling if the May Ohio Sales are cancelled like we did with the March Ohio Dorset Sale. Dick Reece seconded. Motion carried.

Deb Hopkins presented the proposed 2020 Dorset Futurity Budget with a proposed pay out of over \$4000. Dick Reece moved to accept the futurity budget as presented. Linda Mastin seconded. Motion carried.

-Breed Standard Education: Discussion was held on doing more education on the slick shearing guidelines for the CDC. Photos will need to be gathered of proper and improper shearing techniques, then we can put together a photo gallery on the CDC website for breeders' reference. Deb will see if any photos are available as we may need to get some taken, and will get together with Michael Pope for posting. There are no new names nominated for the Certified Judges List

at this time.

-Production Committee: Nothing new to report at this time.

-Dorset Youth Grant Program: The 2020 winners were selected from the 35 applications received and have been notified. They are: Junior-Harlow Cushway, IN; Intermediate-Braxton Young, KS and Senior-Megan Smith, MT. Michael Pope reported the newly adjusted scoring rubric worked better as there weren't as many tied scores.

-Newsletter and Website: Deb Hopkins reported that the 2020 winter newsletter had strong advertising support once again and the CDC broke even on it. This special issue was sent to all buyers of Dorset sheep the previous year whether they were CDC members or not. The 2020 Spring/Summer connection advertising deadline is April 15th. Deb is concerned about getting this issue done due to ever changing circumstances in our world. Dick Reece moved to do an online version only. Glenn Stunkel seconded. Motion carried. **(UPDATE: The Spring/Summer Issue was never done due to the news during those months constantly changing, and the fact that it got to be too late into May/June and the heavy registration paper season. Lots of Face Book posts were done keeping Dorset breeders apprised of happenings.)**

-Dorset Hall of Fame: The CDC has two 2020 Hall of Fame Inductees to recognize at the Annual Membership Meeting now moved to May Ohio Sale. **(UPDATE: Of course we were never able to do this so both nominees will be recognized next year. Skip Heeg was one of our 2020 honorees. Skip did know of this honor and unfortunately we lost him late spring. We will be looking forward to being with his family next year to properly induct Skip into the Dorset Hall of Fame. We are still going to keep our other honoree under wraps until next year.)**

-All-American Junior Show: Deb Hopkins reported that the 2020 All-American Junior Show is still moving forward with show plans for July 2-5, 2020 at the Michigan State University Livestock Pavilion in East Lansing. The Dorset exhibitors and their families will have a meet & greet dessert

social on Saturday sponsored by the Junior Dorset Association. Deb has posted the sign-up sheet online and has gotten a lot of class sponsorships covered. Kendrick Dorset has generously donated a horned ewe lamb to be sold at the May Ohio Dorset Sale. Thank you to them for their support. The AAJS is also doing an online semen auction to generate extra revenue for the show and Deb will reach out to Dorset breeders for donations. We still could use a donation of a Polled Ewe Lamb or equivalent value to come up with the Dorset sponsorship for the show. In 2021 the show will be in Illinois, 2022 Massachusetts and 2023 in Wisconsin. **(UPDATE: The 2020 AAJS was cancelled in Michigan. All Dorset class sponsorships, raffle ticket sales and the sale from the Kendrick Horned Ewe Lamb will be rolled over for the 2021 show in Illinois. Those of you that committed to class sponsorships but did not pay this year, I will invoice you next spring. Thank you in advance for your support!)**

-National Junior Association: The junior association is planning on having a meet & greet dessert social at the 2020 All-American and their 2020 Annual Meeting will be in Louisville in November. The scholarship application has been updated for the 2020 applicants and is posted online. Thanks to Allison Smith, who orchestrated an online NDJA benefit auction this spring, and the numerous supporters of the sale, over \$4000 was raised to put into the junior association account. The 2020 Annual Meeting will be planned for Louisville this fall. **(UPDATE: The National Junior Dorset Association will not be able to host an in-person meeting in Louisville this fall, as they are not allowed. The NJDA Board of Directors will do a special online meeting this fall to organize the business of the association for the upcoming year.)**

OLD BUSINESS:

-2020 Eastern & North Central Director Election Results: Glenn Stunkel was re-elected to serve his second three year term as the Eastern Director. Jeremy Crouch was elected to serve as the new North Central Director. He is replacing retiring North Central Director Dick Reece. Thanks to

Dick for his service of six years to the CDC and its membership.

-Frame Slick Shorn Breeding

Sheep: Some of the directors had concern with the wording change to "Frame Slick Shorn Breeding Sheep" of the classes at our National Shows and All American as they were afraid folks would just show the larger frame sheep in this particular slick shorn division. To be more inclusive, Dick Reece moved to change the wording to "Frame Influenced Slick Shorn Breeding Sheep Classes". Rachael Gately seconded. Motion carried. Deb will get corrected in the NAILE and All American class lists.

-2020 Sedalia Coverage: Deb Hopkins will ship awards out to Heartland Group. **(UPDATE: Sedalia never actually happened so the CDC did work with Integrity Livestock Sales for an CDC Online Sale early June.)**

NEW BUSINESS:

-2020 NAILE National Dorset

Shows: Deb Hopkins reported that she participated in March meeting in Louisville. The big news coming out of the meeting was the new policy of breeds with large fitted and slick shorn numbers to be able to name a fitted and slick shorn champion with both representatives to go into the Supreme Champion Drive. For the Polled Dorset shows that have two divisions of slick shorn we will need to select an overall slick shorn champion to represent as you need to have 50 head or more of slick shorn to be eligible. After much discussion, Dick Reece moved to send the two separate representatives to the Supreme Drive for the Polled Dorset breed but still to name an overall Polled Dorset Champion during breed shows as we have several traveling awards for these honors named after prominent breeders in the Dorset breed. Glenn Stunkel seconded. Motion carried. Deb will get that updated in the NAILE premium list.

The Open Polled Show judge choices submitted were: 1st: Mark Johnson, 2nd: Dustin Cruit, 3rd: Steve Reid and the Open Horned Show judge choices were: 1st: Dick Kuzemchak, 2nd: Dick John Mrozinski, 3rd: Rich Jacobsen. Tuesday will be Open Dorset Show day. Open Horned Dorset show was under 50 head for sec-

ond year in a row so we need to get the numbers up this fall to keep the show moving forward. Junior Breeding sheep show judges will be selected by mail ballot at a later date. Mark Johnson was named to be Junior Breeding Sheep Showmanship judge. Junior Showmanship will start at 9:00 AM on Friday, an hour earlier. Junior show is going back the three rings only on Saturday.

-2021 CDC Director Elections: New England & Great Lakes will be electing directors next winter. Nominating committees will need to be made known to the office for announcement in the 2020 fall newsletter. Great Lakes Director Michael Pope has served two three years terms and will be retiring off the board. New England Director Rachael Gately has served one three year term and is eligible to run for a second term.

(UPDATE: The Great Plains Regional Junior Dorset Show was held at the Pistol Pete Classic, OK; the New England Regional Junior Dorset Show was held at the NEYSS and there was a Midwest Super Regional Junior Dorset Show held at the Youth Sheep Expo in IN. All others were cancelled.)

-2020 & 2021 Annual Meeting & National Sale: The 2020 Annual Meeting & National Dorset Sale for all Polled & Horned Dorset will be slated for the May Ohio Dorset Sale moving forward. The 2020 National Dorset Wether Sire & Dam and National Dorset Advantage Sale will be at Midwest Stud Ram Sale, Sedalia, MO. **(UPDATE: There was no 2020 National Dorset Sale in person due to the cancellation of all of the in-person sales. With that being said, plans for the 2021 will**

be the original plans from 2020 with the National Polled & Horned Breeding Sheep Sale being at the March Ohio Dorset Sale and the National Wether Type & Dorset Advantage Sale being at Midwest Stud Ram Sale in mid-June. Since there was never an in-person sale to host an annual 2020 CDC membership meeting, there will not be one scheduled for 2020 and will make plans for the 2021 Annual Meeting at the March Ohio Dorset Sale.)

Set a Strategy and Budget for Selecting for Your Next Ram

Many producers will be looking for a new ram to buy for this fall's breeding season. We all want to find a bargain: the highest quality genetics for a bargain price. However, producers can spend some time now developing a selection strategy and setting up a budget to determine what a ram is worth to your operation. Consider the ram an investment and think about what value that ram will bring to your operation.

When looking at a ram as an investment an item to consider would be how he will impact improved production. How will his lambs compare to previous lambs born on your operation? Will they have heavier weaning weights? Will they be more acceptable to buyers? What traits will his daughters exhibit to improve performance? These are all considerations that not only impact your bottom line the first year after this ram produces lambs, but into the future as you retain daughters in your flock.

First consider what production traits your ewes exhibit as strengths. Then, look at what traits you would consider weaknesses. Pull out production records from the past couple years to assess the strengths and weaknesses. Finally, rank the traits that you would like to see in a ram that would best fit your operation's goals. You might even want to classify these traits into categories such as growth traits, carcass traits, or maternal traits. Growth traits would include weaning and post weaning weights, while carcass traits would include loin depth (or size) and fat thickness. Maternal traits often include number lambs born and number lambs weaned and may also include scrotal circumference of the rams because rams with larger scrotal size tend to improve reproductive performance in ewe lambs. One other category to consider would be parasite resistance.

Once you have determined the top traits you would like to see in a new ram, you can now start the selection process. Ideally, you would have EBVs on your ewe flock and can choose a new ram based on both EBV traits and visual appraisal. However, purebred flocks without EBVs and commercial flocks can both utilize EBVs to identify rams with the genetic potential to meet your performance improvement goals. Always choose several traits to move your flock toward higher performance. Single trait selection often results in decreases in other important traits.

The final consideration in ram selection, but often the starting point for many producers, is the price. How much can you afford to pay for a ram? This not only depends on your bank account but should also depend on the value of that ram to your operation. So, how do you determine what is appropriate?

Start with estimating the salvage value of the ram once you are finished using him. If you sell aged rams to

other producers, how much do you charge? If you follow this path are there any health tests you have performed to ensure the buyer that the ram won't share any diseases with the new flock? Subtract those costs to arrive at a salvage value. If you send the ram to a sale barn, what is the likely value for cull rams? Or, will the salvage value be zero because you expect that your ram will live the rest of his life at your farm?

Let's take a look at an example of paying \$1500 for a ram that you will use for 2 years and who services 35 ewes each year. After you finish using this ram you intend to sell him through a sale barn for about \$200. This makes the difference between the purchase price and the salvage value \$1300. When you divide this by the two years you plan to use the ram, then you arrive at a depreciation cost of \$650 annually. If you divide the annual depreciation cost of \$650 by the number of ewes serviced, the depreciation per ewe is \$18.57. Or, you can divide this by the average value of the lambs you sell, and you get the pounds of lamb each ewe must produce each year in order to cover the cost of ram depreciation. Calculate this by dividing \$18.57 by the sale price for your lambs. In this example we will use \$2.85 for eastern lambs sold at weaning. Thus, 6.5 lbs. produced by each ewe would cover the cost of ram depreciation.

In order to determine if this is acceptable for your operation you will need to know your cost of production. What does it cost you to keep a ewe per year? If you add \$18.57 to her annual costs, how will this impact your operation's profitability? Should this cost be considered an investment for the future when this ram's daughters enter the flock?

Another way to look at the salvage value of the ram is to consider how many lambs per year will it take to cover the depreciation cost. If you sell 60 lb. lambs at \$2.85 per pound, the value of each lamb is \$171. Subtract sales and transportation costs. For this example, let's use \$160 as the value that lamb brings to your operation. Therefore, \$650 divided by \$160/lamb means that it takes about four lambs each year to cover the cost of the ram.

Producers should always purchase the best ram that they can afford. A ram has the potential to impact your flock for many years through his daughters. So, spend some time determining what traits you feel are needed to improve your operation, what value a ram will have to your operation, then decide what you can afford to pay for him.



Kyle Farms Utilizes Dorset Genetics In Large Commercial Operation

Matt Kyle, co-owner of Kyle Farms, kiddingly told me it took a pandemic to get me out to visit him finally! I had to admit it was a welcomed trip in April to finally get out to visit Kyle Farms in Avon, NY and see first hand their very large commercial sheep operation that utilizes a lot of white face genetics, including Dorsets. Co-owners brothers Matt & D.J. Kyle and their cousin Nathan Hatch, operate this over 3400 ewe operation and growing, as a new fourth barn is going up! These barns are 68' wide and vary in length from 432' to 636'. They do house their entire operation under cover now to alleviate predator losses and to be able to maintain quality and constant nutritional intake. Their primary goal of the operation is produce the "hot house" lamb, which is a 40-60# lamb weaned right off their moms and shipped to the exclusive speciality East Coast Markets. Being here out on the East Coast near the largest metro area in the country, there has always been and continues to be a high demand for these kinds of lambs.

Here are some photos of the operation I took this past April. The major purpose of the visit was to pregnancy scan a large group of exposed ewes. Nancy Minitier makes several trips a year out to Avon, to scan for them so they can make their management decisions in the most efficient manner, as efficiency is of the utmost importance to the financial stability of this large commercial sheep operation.

NAILE GOING AHEAD WITH COVID GUIDELINE MODIFICATIONS

The 2020 North American International Livestock Exposition is planning an in person sheep show during November 13-19, 2020 in Louisville, KY for both the junior and open shows. The sheep show schedule is going to pretty much the same as in the past. The exception this year is that you can depart as soon as you are done showing your animals. There will be no National Junior Dorset Association meeting & pizza party this year. Following is a schedule of the specific Dorset events:

-Jr, Breeding Sheep Showmanship: Fri., Nov 13th, 9:00 AM. Julia Chute judging.

-Junior Market Lamb Showmanship: Friday, Nov. 13th, 4:00 PM

-Lead Classes: Friday, Nov. 13th, 5:00 PM

-National Junior Dorset Shows:

Saturday, Nov. 14th, 8:00 AM, Polled Dorsets, Horned Dorsets, & Dorset Advantage, Ring Two. Alex Wolf judging.

-Junior Show Dorset Market Lamb

Show: Saturday, Nov, 14th 8:00 AM,

-National Open Dorset Shows: Tuesday, Nov. 17th, 8:00 AM, Polleds first followed by Horneds. Mark Johnson judging.

Don't forget that in the Junior Dorset Shows: Breeding Sheep Showmanship will be Friday at 9:00 AM. You need to pre-enter the showmanship show online for \$10.00. The entry fees will be put into jackpot premiums and awards. The classes will be divided by age and all breeds will show together. Please make sure you review the special rules in the Dorset section of the premium book for both the open and junior shows as they will be adhered to.

The Junior Shows features a separate Dorset Advantage show. Also, there have been specific wether sire and dam classes and frame influenced slick shorn classes added to the junior shows. **The CDC slick shearing policy will be adhered to as it appears in the premium book. "Slick Shorn presented sheep are to carry a uniform length of wool growth that was shorn 7 days prior to show, with the ONLY exception being on the poll, front legs below the knees and rear legs below the hocks." There is to be no additional belly or flank wool left on the animals.**

For open show exhibitors: In addition to sending in your entries and entry fees to the NAILE when entering the show, please don't forget to send in the matching \$15.00 per individual entry in the

Open Polled and Horned Dorset shows directly to the CDC Office. This enables the CDC to provide matching funds required for our National Shows. **These matching funds need to be sent to the CDC office ASAP if you haven't done so yet.** Please note that junior show sheep do not have to send in matching funds unless they are staying on to be shown in the open shows.

We have three types of Dorsets being shown and there will be three Premier Exhibitor banners presented: Fitted, Frame Influenced Slick Shorn and Wether Type. Group classes are still shown together but groups can be made up of different divisional types BUT per NAILE rules, in the event of a tie for a premier exhibitor banner, the flock class is the tie breaker, should this happen with a Dorset divisional premier, only flocks that completely represent their division will count towards a tie breaker. Exhibitors are solely responsible for determining what to show in their flock and are solely responsible for how it would affect them in the event that are in a tie.

New this year, the Open and Junior Polled Dorset Shows will be having two representatives going into the Supreme Champion drives, fitted and slick shorn. There will be a Champion Overall Slick Shorn selected between the Frame Influenced Slick Shorn division champion and Wether Type division champion to represent the Slick Shorn Polled Dorset in the Supreme Drive, both rams and ewes. We need to combine those two divisions to come up with the minimum number requirement.

There are several COVID related rules & regulations for participation in this year's NAILE. Here are the highlights:

○ PARTICIPANT-ONLY SHOW - The North American International Livestock Exposition will close to the general public, allowing easier contact tracing and also provide the greatest reduction in the spread of COVID-19. Building Access Badges are required to enter the buildings and barn areas. Event Passes only allow you to enter the parking lot and exterior areas of the facility.

○ INCREASED HYGIENE ACCESSIBILITY - Hand sanitizer and handwashing stations will be available throughout the property.

○ MASKS REQUIRED - Masks will be required to be worn by everyone on property. Especially when social distancing is not achievable. This applies for indoor and outdoor areas.

○ SCHEDULE CHANGES - The 2020 North American Championship Rodeo and

Country Store, and awards banquets associated with competitions have been cancelled. Additional Schedule changes have been made so please check the livestock and equine online schedules.

○ WIDER AISLE WAYS - Aisles inside the facility will be widened and some identified as one-way aisles.

○ PROHIBITED OVERNIGHT IN-BUILDING CAMPING & COOKING - Tent setup and overnight camping within the building is not prohibited. Though, they just came out with an update on this policy about sleeping in the barn with your animals. In addition, usage of kitchen or cooking equipment within the building is prohibited. RV and outdoor camping on property is still available.

PRE-ARRIVAL INFORMATION

● Participants will not be allowed to enter the facility unless they can attest (with a written, signed document) that they have not been to a state that has a COVID-19 positivity rate equal to or greater than 15% 14 days prior to the date of their scheduled arrival time. This document will be sent to participants and also available at the check-in process.

● The Main Entrance (Gate 1) will be open throughout the show and is at the intersection of Freedom Way and Phillips Lane.

● The Kentucky Exposition Center is located at 937 Phillips Ln. Louisville KY

● There is a 3-step system to checking in this year:

1) First, Animal health screenings will be conducted. Please make sure you have all necessary papers showing proof of animal health.

2) Second, Participants will be required to complete or provide their COVID-19 waiver affirming they are in good health. Contact information will be collected and a wristband will be given to all participants and helpers. You must keep this wristband on throughout the event. The wristband does NOT permit you inside the building. A building access badge is required to enter the building.

3) Third, You will then receive appropriate credentialing to access the property and building in the form of pre-purchased event passes and building access badges

It is definitely going to be a different event this year for sure. Enjoy the showing opportunity and please adhere to the special rules put in place to keep you safe and stay healthy.

Marion Alene Meno, long-time Continental Dorset Club Secretary, died peacefully February 12th in Anthem, AZ with her family at her side. She was born June 13, 1936 in Washington, PA, daughter of J.R. and Hazel Henderson. She was 83 and in a very real sense was born into Dorsets and spent nearly all of her life involved with the breed. 

Skip and Cheryl welcomed first son Kenneth into the family in 1966 and in 1967 Skip accepted the position of shepherd and swine herdsman at UMass, Amherst and then went on to be shepherd at Three Meadows Hampshire Farm in Peru, VT. In 1970 Skip enrolled at the University of Rhode Island to complete his BS and MS degrees. While at URI, Skip worked as Shepherd for Carousel Farm Shropshires and also worked with the National Institute of Health involved with hematocrit and nutrition stabilization for an artificial lung project.

In 1973 Skip and Cheryl welcomed their second son Jason, and Skip accepted the position of dairy and livestock specialist with Agway Feed Company in West Springfield, MA. He later transferred to Agway headquarters in Syracuse, NY, where Skip became a leading animal nutritionist nationally. The family lived outside of Syracuse in Tully and that was where Heeg Polled Dorsets came into national prominence. Skip used genetics from Cornell, UConn, URI, Myers, Cardinal Creek, Poynter and Riverwood Farms. Skip also served on the CDC Board of Directors and was President from 1989-1991.

Skip retired from Agway after 23 years and took other animal nutritional positions in Lancaster, PA and Lakeland, FL before finally retiring and moving to Tucson, AZ to be closer to family, and to become flock consultant for his son Jason's sheep operation in Montana. Skip worked on race horse formulations along with dairy & beef nutritional diets.

Skip is survived by sons, Kenneth (Mary) Heeg and Jason (Denise Linford) Heeg, 5 grandchildren and 6 great grandchildren. Skip is preceded in death by his wife Cheryl.



DR. NATHAN S. HALE

Dr. Nathan S. Hale of Lakeland, FL, emeritus professor of Animal Science at the University of Connecticut, died peacefully at his home on June 11th, 2020. He was 96 years of age. Dr. Hale was a Professor of Animal Science at the UConn College of Agriculture and Natural Resources from 1954 to 1985. He previously worked as a Professor, from 1946 to 1954, at the University of Massachusetts. He received his Bachelor degree from the University of Connecticut and his Masters and Doctorate degrees from the University of Minnesota.

Born in Portland, CT, the son of C. Harry and Dorothy Hale, his lineage directly traces back 11 generations to his ancestors who settled in Connecticut and Massachusetts in the 1630's. Nathan spent his formative years on the family crop and livestock farm. It was at an early age that he developed an appreciation for animals and their proper management and care which he later instilled in hundreds of students that enrolled in the courses that he taught. In addition to his teaching and research he served as advisor to many of the Animal Science students. Dr. Hale always enjoyed the satisfaction of watching the progress of his students and all their subsequent successes, which were later achieved in their chosen fields.

At UConn he headed the Animal Husbandry section of the Animal Science Department where he taught livestock management courses, as well as genetics and breeding for farm animal improvement. He further served his students by coaching several of the department's intercollegiate judging teams, conducting livestock extension and short course programs, and serving as a judge of livestock at major northeastern agricultural fairs. Several of his judging teams attained a high national ranking.

Dr. Hale's service and dedication to his field was recognized and honored with many awards. For example, in 1985, his excellence in teaching, research, and public service was commended with the prestigious designation of "Fellow" in the American Society of Animal Science, the highest honor the Society can bestow on its members. He was also recognized with Alumni Awards from the UConn Block and Bridle Club and the UConn Agriculture and Natural Resources Alumni Association which presented him with the Distinguished Alumnus Award in 1999. Additionally, he held offices as president of the Northeast Section of the American Society of Animal Science and as Director, and then president of the Continental Dorset Club. Dr. Hale was active when his children were young as a leader with 4-H and Boy Scouts.

After retirement from UConn, Dr. Hale continued his service in the community. He was a board member for Juniper Hill Village and then was president of the Glen Ridge Cooperative Retirement units. He was a Deacon at the Storrs Congregational Church and served on many church committees. In addition to being a 40-year member of that church, he later became an associate member of the First United Methodist Church of Lakeland, FL.

Nate is survived by a daughter, Mary L Hale of Pineville, NC; and two sons, Jonathan (Kathy) Hale of South Windsor, CT, and Dr. Daniel (Linda) Hale and of College Station, TX; a daughter-in-law Ann Hale of Spring Lake, NJ; eleven grandchildren; sixteen great-grandchildren; and two sisters, Dorothy Simpson of S. Yarmouth, MA and Ann Hale of Portland, CT. Nate was predeceased by his wife of 65 years, Ann; his son, Nathan Jr; and his brothers, Chet and Douglas.

Arden G. Shaffner, 78, of Annapolis, IL, died October 18, 2020, at Newton Care Center in Newton, IL. He was born December 7, 1941, in Annapolis, IL, the son of Lavaughn & Verlie (Lingafelter) Shaffner, both of whom preceded him in death. He was also preceded in death by his step-father, Ansel Buckner; and by his sister, Joan Nichols.

Arden grew up in the Annapolis area, where he learned the value of hard, honest work by tending to his family's sheep, a business they had been invested in for generations. Over the course of his life, he made a name for himself showing sheep all across the United States with some of the best sheep dogs in the country. He was director and President of the Continental Dorset Club for a time. His capacity for work was truly the stuff of legend, and so it came to no surprise that, upon "retiring" from the farm in 1990, he got on with Case IH in Casey, where he'd work until finally calling it quits in 2008.

Never one to let dust settle, this season of Arden's life often found him in his wood shop, where he made countless treasures that his loved ones will cherish for years to come. They could all attest to the man's love of deer hunting and of sport, especially Cardinal's baseball or

University of Illinois athletics, (the latter of which was often a source of great frustration in his life!) His family and friends could also speak to the man's strong will, which he earned over a lifetime of lessons learned.

Arden Shaffner was, in short, "old school", in that he worked hard and lived with profound honesty and integrity. The rectitude with which he lived pointed to the faith which filled his 78 years. A lifelong member and former elder at Pleasant Grove Cumberland Presbyterian Church, we are thankful that Arden knew his Shepherd and the eternal life that only He can provide.

2020 DORSET FUTURITY UPDATE

The CDC has been holding its 2020 Dorset Futurity Program as much as normal as we possibly can during this crazy summer and fall. The breeders supported the program this spring by nominating 115 polled ewe lambs, 25 dorset advantage ewe lambs, 21 horned dorset ewe lambs and the juniors re-nominated 12 yearling ewes. So please, keep sending in those point records forms on shows you are attending this fall. We only accept forms from actual live showing events. We know that your location played a role in how many events you could feasibly attend but everyone has been affected and we do pay out regionally in the polled ewe lamb futurity which will be the major emphasis once again this year for premium payouts.

There will be no live presentations of the final futurity awards at Louisville this November. Your NAILE showings will count toward final national point standings. The CDC office will tally final point standings the following week as we need to get things verified, and all awards and payments will be mailed out directly from the CDC office.

CDC & NDJA DORSET EWE YOUTH PURCHASE GRANT PROGRAM

The National Junior Dorset Association and the CDC introduced a grant program for youth to use towards the purchase of a Dorset ewe and it has been very successful for the past seven years, as we received a high number of 35 applications last year.
