

Congratulations to Nichols Sheep Farm, Twin Oaks Dorsets and the Cassell Family on their National Grand Champions, A complete sale report appears later in this newsletter, along with more photos.

The Ohio Dorset Association provided sandwiches and cupcakes for the Annual Meeting attendees, so thank you to them and Pat Myers for putting that together. The Annual Meeting also highlighted the 2017 Dorset Hall of Fame Induction and this year we had two stellar breeders to induct. Tim Morehead, Cherry Valley, IL and Gary Saylor, Belle Center, OH were very much surprised at their very well deserved induction. CONTINENTAL DORSET CLUB 2017 ANNUAL BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEETING MINUTES March 16, 2017 HOLIDAY INN EXPRESS, RICHMOND, IN

The meeting was called to order at 4:55 PM by President Dick Reece. Directors Michael Pope, Jerry Gross, and Director Elect Glenn Stunkel were in attendance. Directors Mike Wright, Coulter Passwaters and Bob Heuvel were on the telephone. CDC Exec. Sec./Treas. Deb Hopkins was also present.

- -Secretary Minutes: Deb Hopkins presented in writing the minutes from the 2016 CDC Fall-Teleconference Meeting held December 8, 2016. Coulter Passwaters moved to accept the minutes as written. Michael Pope seconded. Motion passed.
- **-Treasurer's Report:** Deb Hopkins presented the financial report for the fiscal



2017 Best Headed Awards for the National Polled & Horned Dorset Sale Marlene Bell of Ewephoric Designs, has generously donated these awards for the National Sale every year since their inception. This year they were beautiful purses and mats. Thank-you to Marlene for these wonderful and artistic awards!

2016-2017 year to date as of March 5, 2017.Total income is \$26,276.36, total expenses is \$45,265.60 for a current net cash loss of \$18,989.20. Account balances - Checking Account: \$21,389.30; Savings Account: \$25.00; CD: \$26,068.78; Money Market: \$10.134.97: Junior Association \$32,239,24 for total cash assets of \$89,857.29. Michael Pope moved to accept the treasurer's report. Jerry Gross seconded. Motion passed. Deb Hopkins also presented a proposed budget for 2017-2018 for the board to review as it goes through the meeting. -CDC Stats: Deb Hopkins presented the 2016-2017 statistics to date. As of February 28, 2017: 1,383 head have been registered and 629 head have been transferred. The registrations are down 336 head from the same period last year and the transfers are down 265 head from the same period last year. In the Dorset Advantage registry, 32 head have been registered to date and 42 head have been transferred. The registrations are down 13 head from the same time period last year and transfers are up 14 head from the same period as last year. Deb also reported that Dorsets were 5th in registrations and 5th in transfers last year across all breeds.

-Correspondence: A thank-you note was received and read from last year's Scholarship winner, Rebecca Helton, Macon, Missouri.

COMMITTEE REPORTS:

-Dorset Futurity: Michael Pope moved in the Yearling Ewe Division, if any of the three divisions (polled, horned or Dorset Advantage) have 5 or more ewes re-nominated for participation, then that division will pull out to compete for a separate set of premiums, if not then they will compete with the others. Coulter Passwaters seconded. This was done to encourage participation of more than just Polled Yearling ewes. The question of a bred and owned division was brought forth but no action was taken due to lack of a motion. Deb brought up the complexity of keeping track of online sales and their futurity nominations. Some breeders are good about letting the office know, others not so much. Online sales managements also attempts to keep track but sometimes sheep fall through the system. Michael moved to design a futurity online sale nomination form, post on the website for breeders to fill out and submit to the CDC office with ewe lamb identifications. Mike Wright

seconded. Motion carried. Deb will design form and get posted on the CDC website for breeder's use.

-Breed Standard Education: Casev Sidwell, Jerry Gross and Bob Heuvel presented a Dorset Advantage Standards of Excellence and Scorecard. After discussion and fixing some wording, Coulter Passwaters moved to accept the Dorset Advantage Breed Standard as corrected. Michael Pope seconded. Motion carried. Deb will get corrected and posted on the CDC website for breeders and send to states waiting on document to get Dorset Advantage into shows. Jerry Gross moved to accept Jeff Held and Jason Shuck onto the certified Dorset Judges list. Michael Pope seconded. Motion carried. Classification of Dorset wethers was discussed and it was decided to send major shows a copy of the Dorset Breed Standards and ask them to give to their classifiers.

-Production Committee: Nothing new to report at this time but Deb encouraged production breeders to get involved with the NSIP program and to utilize the CDC program that prints performance data on the registration papers at time of registration.

-Dorset Youth Grant Program: The 2017 winners were selected: Junior: Kinzie Bell, OK; Intermediate: Mary Lynn Jones, IN and Senior: Layne Miller, NE. They all were notified soon after January 1st of their grant awards. Bob Heuvel requested clarification on the application form that the grants are to be for sheep purchased in the year the grant is awarded. There was some confusion on this. Deb will make clear on the application form and get re-posted on the CDC website. Also, make sure all old forms are not anywhere as applicants filling out the old forms caused some confusion. Michael Pope also requested a change in scoring on the housing question which will also be addressed and modified in the scoring rubric. -Newsletter and Website: Deb Hopkins

reported that the 2017 winter newsletter had strong advertising support and netted an income of \$454.20. This special issue was sent to all buyers of Dorset sheep the previous year whether they were CDC members or not. The 2017 Spring/Summer connection deadline is soon and will be completed for Sedalia. The web page has been updated as soon as possible to keep everyone current with happenings thanks to Frank Tiffany's great service.

-Dorset Hall of Fame: The CDC will recognize Tim Morehead, Cherry Valley, IL and Gary Saylor, Belle Center, OH at the annual membership meeting tomorrow. They will be inducted as the 2017 Dorset Hall of Fame class. Nominations into the

hall of fame can be made by anyone, not just a member of the CDC. The board would like to encourage folks to put in nominations for the 2018 class.

-All-American Junior Show: Deb Hopkins reported that the 2017 All-American Junior Show will be June 30-July 2, 2017 at the Alliant Energy Center, Madison, WI. The Dorset exhibitors and their families will once again have a lunch on Saturday sponsored by the Junior Dorset Association. Jeff Held will be judging the Horned & Polled Dorsets and Dorset Advantage on Sunday. Deb would also like to thank Cassell Horned Dorsets for donating a ewe lamb to be sold this weekend for the All American. Also, thank-you to GT Dorsets, RSO Livestock and Steva Robinson for donating semen that was and will be sold in online sales to benefit the All American. The AAJS Class Sponsorship sheet will also be around this weekend to get filled out. Next year will be the 25th Anniversary of the All American and it will be going back to its roots in Indiana at the State Fairgrounds.

-National Junior Association: The junior association is planning on having an informal meeting and BBQ lunch at the 2017 All-American and their 2017 Annual Meeting will be in Louisville in November. The scholarship application has been updated for the 2017 applicants and is posted online.

OLD BUSINESS:

-2017 Eastern & North Central Director Election Results: Dick Reece was re-elected to serve his second three year term as the North Central Director. Glenn Stunkel was elected to serve as the new Eastern Director. He is replacing retiring Eastern Director Coulter Passwaters who served six years. Thanks to Coulter Passwaters for his service to the CDC and its membership.

-Registry Program: Deb presented the email from the Katahdin Hair Sheep International sent out seeking bids to do their registry work. After discussion it was decided to pass on the opportunity at this time and have Deb remain focused on the CDC and her responsibilities. Deb has been working with the Montadale association getting them set up to purchase the CDC program and register their own sheep by next year, so that will make four breed associations the CDC has sold their program to and Frank Tiffany maintains the program for.

NEW BUSINESS:

-2017 NAILE National Dorset Shows: Deb Hopkins reported that she did attend the NAILE sheep advisory committee meeting. The judge selections have been submitted with Billy Wade being first choice for the Open Polled Show and Jim Brandt first choice for the Open Horned Dorset Show. For the junior breeding sheep show: Dustin Cruit, Kyle Thaver. Travis Hoffman and Jason Heeg were the first choices submitted. Katherine Kuykendall was nominated as the breeding sheep showmanship judge for her second year. The CDC has submitted a proposal to add back the Late Fall Fitted Ram Lamb class in the Open Polled Dorset Show, and for three premier banners be presented for the Fitted, Slick Shorn and Wether Sire & Dam divisions. Changes that were recommended at the meeting were October 1st ownership date for the junior show, pre-registration for showmanship with a minimal entry fee for better divisional awards and possible premiums, and the possibility of a commercial ewe lamb division to be included with the junior wether show. The tentative schedule for the National Dorset shows will be Junior Show on Saturday, November 11 and Open Shows on Tuesday, November 14 with Horneds first followed by Polleds. -2018 CDC Director Elections: New

England & Great Lakes will be electing directors next winter. Nominating committees will need to be made known to the office for announcement in the 2017 fall newsletter. Great Lakes Director Michael Pope is eligible to run for a second term and New England Director Mike Wright will be retiring as he has served two three year terms.

-Regional Junior Show Sites: The 2017 Eastern Regional Junior Dorset Show will be held at the Keystone International Livestock Exposition, Harrisburg, PA on October, 8, 2017.

to see if they can organize a breakfast along with the annual membership meeting on early Friday morning. The board meeting will be scheduled for Thursday evening at a local hotel.

-History Book: Deb reported that Marion Meno has sent her the masters for the original book so additional printings could be done. Deb asked about the possibility of doing an insert to update the book for the 2023 125th CDC Anniversary for the years missing. Deb will look into the cost of doing such a project.

-Election of 2017-2018 Officers: Michael Pope nominated Dick Reece as President. Coulter Passwaters seconded. Motion Carried. Coulter Passwaters nominated Michael Pope as Vice President. Jerry Gross seconded. Motion carried.
-Budget: Coulter Passwaters moved to

2017 DORSET HALL OF FAME CLASS



TIM MOREHEAD

Tim started his 4-H sheep flock when he was 9 years old. He started out with a very small Suffolk flock. The Suffolks only lasted for about a year and Tim's Dad got rid of them when one of the rams hurt his sister, Diane. Tim then purchased a few Dorset sheep and his flock continued to grow for 49 years.

In Tim's younger years he was a member of the Flora Producers 4-H Club and a member of the Belvidere FFA Chapter. Tim was also a pretty good baseball player. After graduation from high school Tim never attended college but went directly to work with his father farming over 900 acres and milking cows.

The very first time Tim took sheep to the Wisconsin State Fair he didn't know how to fit a sheep so, he just carded the sheep up to look like a big cotton ball. The Brockman Brothers took Tim under their wing and showed him how to fit a sheep. Tim ended up being one of the best fitters in the purebred sheep industry. Nothing was ever good enough for him and he always thought he could do better. Tim & Diane's flock of Dorset sheep grew to just over 300 head and that was still not enough for Tim's Dad as they added another quality flock of Montadales, which would be his younger sister Donna Jo's flock.

Tim was the only fitter in the family and he always had the sheep looking top notch, including the Montadales! When Tim was in high school he would be in charge of taking over 20 head of sheep plus his sisters to shows and sales with no supervision. The sheep always came first in Tim's eyes.

The Morehead Dorsets were dominant at the shows and sales in the late 70's and early 80's, and their genetics became prominent in the Dorset breed. Tim's flock was put on the map with a stud ram he bought from Stony Point Ranch in California called "Golden Bear". Morehead Dorsets had Champion Polled Dorset Ram in Louisville for 6 years that included a five year straight run from 1976-1980. Thrown in those Ram Champions, was also Champion Ewe in 1978. Tim sold a stud ram to Steve Myers and that ram, "Emperor", was named Supreme Champion Ram at Louisville in 1983. The Morehead flock also had several National Sale and Ohio Sale Champions throughout those years. Breeders across the country bought Morehead sheep and implemented those genetics into their breeding programs.

Tim ending up selling his flock of Dorset Sheep to the Spilde Brothers in 1995. About a year after that, his niece and nephew got back in the Dorset business as Cordray Dorsets, and Tim became their silent partner. During the month of August, Tim was always busy with helping 4-Her's getting their sheep ready for the fair. Tim also drove truck for Anderson Underground and was a shepherd for Spring Dale Farms Hampshires. Tim judged a lot

of county and state fairs as well as sheep sales around the country.

Today, Tim is still very much involved with the Dorsets as he guides and mentors his great niece with her Dorset flock. The Dorsets remain on Tim's farm today. It is a great honor to induct Tim Morehead into the Dorset Hall of Fame.



GARY SAYLOR


Gary Saylor has been involved in the Dorset industry nearly his entire life. He was initially involved as part of his family's flock in 1970 and then Gary's family branched out on their own as Twin Oaks Dorsets in 1994. Over the years, Twin Oaks Dorsets has been a team effort with Gary, his wife Becky and their children Cam, Kelsey and Cole.





DORSET COMMERCIAL CONNECTION

Have You Tested The Water Lately?

One of the most important nutrients in sheep diets is water. Water mineral levels can affect water taste and smell. Poor water quality can affect intake, which in turn affects animal growth and milk production. In order to maximize feed intake and promote fast growth, sheep need access to a high quality water source. So, have you tested your water lately to know just what your sheep are drinking?

According to "Nutrient Requirements of Small Ruminants" from the National Research Council, water use during gestation increases as much as 130 percent from the first to the fifth month of gestation. The Sheep Production Handbook from the American Sheep Industry states, "On average, sheep drink about 1.0 to 1.5 gallons of water for each 4.0 pounds of dry matter consumed."

During cool times of the year, such as in the spring and in the fall, sheep meet most of their water requirement through consuming pasture. However, obviously, water requirements vary throughout the year and depend on production status of the sheep. It is also possible for forages to have very high moisture levels that limit dry matter intake. In other words, the sheep fill up on water and do not consume enough dry matter to meet their nutrient needs. Several other factors can affect water consumption. Temperature is probably the most obvious. Sheep normally consume more water when temperatures rise above 70 degrees F. Increased water intake allows sheep to account for higher levels of water loss due to increased respiration, or rapid breathing, on hot days. On the other hand, when temperatures fall below 20 degrees F, water consumption drops. The low water temperatures affect rumen microbial function. This can then decrease milk Livestock watering sources should be tested regularly production for ewes nursing lambs

during cold weather as well as growth rates for lambs.

Sheep Production Handbook goes on to explain that ideal water temperatures range between 45 degrees and 55 degrees F. While it is not practical to maintain these water temperatures at all times, sheep producers can keep this in mind throughout the year. During the summer, producers can locate water troughs in shaded areas whenever possible. For the winter, heaters will not only prevent freezing, but can also help to keep water temperatures closer to these ideals.

Unless you hand water your sheep, you may not be aware of how much water your sheep drink on a daily basis. However, testing water is one method to assess potential

intake. Check with your local Cooperative Extension office to locate a water testing company near you with the ability to assess water quality for livestock. Here are some parameters to consider when you look at the water test results.

Livestock can tolerate some bacteria in the water. The preferred range according to the Agricultural Waste Management Field Handbook of the Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) is less than 200 per 100 ml, but these bacteria should not be fecal coliform bacteria. Any presence of fecal coliform bacteria can create problems in young animals, although older animals can tolerate up to 10 per 100 ml.

Water pH studies have shown few if any livestock health issues or decreased performance. However, NRCS recommends water pH fall between 6.8 and 7.5, with expected problems to occur when the pH falls below 5.5 or is above 8.5 Total dissolved solids (TDS) assesses the total amount of all inorganic contaminants in a water sample, often thought of as mineral levels. NRCS suggests that TDS levels should be below 500 mg/L, although TDS levels up to 3,000 mg/L can still be acceptable, depending on the exact contaminant in the water. Several research studies showed that sheep are much

> more tolerant of high TDS levels than other livestock species and extend this maximum to 10,000 mg/L, except for lactating ewes. However, be aware that high mineral levels that cause decreased water intake, could lead to problems with urinary calculi, particularly in rams and wethers. Animals may experience some diarrhea and shortterm decreased water intake when first introduced to water sources with 2,000 to 4,900 ppm TDS levels according to Nutrient Requirements of Small Ruminants. Discuss any concerns about your water test results with your veterinarian or your nutritionist.

Aesthetic pollutants, such as iron, manganese and sulfates, commonly cause water related problems because they influence the taste and smell of the water and can result in decreased intakes. Other pollutants, such as nitrates and heavy metals, can cause health related issues. Although NRCS has no recommended maximum standards for iron and manganese levels for livestock, the human standard should be below 0.3 mg/L for

iron and 0.05 mg/L for manganese. The desired level of sulfates in water for livestock is less than 250 mg/L, and the expected problem range for livestock is set at over 5,000 mg/L. Recommended nitrate levels should fall below 100 mg/L.

Overall, a clean, fresh and cool water supply is important to promote growth and performance in a sheep flock. For more information on water quality for sheep, check out the Nutritive Needs of Sheep section in the Nutrition chapter of the Sheep Production Handbook, Nutrient Requirements of Small Ruminants, or the Agricultural Waste Management Field Handbook.

The 2017 Futurity will expand the yearling ewe payouts. The Polled Dorsets, Horned Dorsets and Dorset Advantage have all competed for one premium scale payout but, the Horned Dorsets and Dorset Advantage were at a disadvantage due to their smaller class sizes. The CDC board recently voted to expand the premiums.

If 5 or more head of one type are participating then they will break out to receive a separate premium scale. The divisions with less than five head will compete together for another premium scale.

This will give more opportunity for all of the different types of Dorsets to compete more fairly and be eligible for premiums.

NAILE CHANGES PROMOTES SHOWING OF ALL DORSET TYPES


Last year several class changes were added to the National Dorset Shows in Louisville, both open and junior. The Junior Show features classes for fitted, slick shorn, Dorset wether type and Dorset Advantage breeding sheep. The Open Show has classes for fitted, slick shorn and Dorset wether type sheep. The classes were put in last year and though participation was good we only expect the class sizes to grow now that all Dorset breeders know the classes are now available allowing breeders to showcase their breeding stock, no matter what kind of Dorset they raise.

In anticipation of the growing class size in the open show, the CDC will be offering three separate Premier Exhibitor Banners in the Open Dorset Show. One for Fitted, one for Slick Shorn and one for Wether Type sheep. The class sizes are not at a point to have separate shows so the group classes will still be shown altogether and each group entry needs to be made of the same type/division.

Looking forward to showcasing all types of Dorset sheep at the National Shows in Louisville this fall.

DORSET JUNIOR SHOWS ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS

Following are the eligibility requirements for the Regional Junior Dorset Shows, All American Junior Show and the National Junior Dorset Shows in Louisville for your information:

- Exhibitor must be a current member of the CDC whether in the youth enrollment program or as a lifetime member.
- 2) Exhibitor needs to be 21 years old or younger as of January 1st of the current year. There is no lower age limit but the exhibitor must be able to lead and/or control the head of his/her animal in the show ring.
- 3) Exhibitor must be present to show their own animals unless physically impaired. The junior owner will need to be at the head of the animal controlling it in the show ring, unless of course they have more than one entry in a class in which case another junior exhibitor showing their second animal is acceptable.
- 4) Sheep must be registered in the youth's name. Youth partnerships are acceptable except for futurity animals which must be in the individual youth owner's name ONLY. Farm names or family" ownerships are not acceptable.
- 5) Exhibitor can show at an unlimited number of regional junior shows per year, the CDC does prefer they at least show at the regional show in which they reside if possible.

6) EWE FUTURITY PROGRAM:

Your futurity ewe can earn double points at a regional junior show for the futurity ewe program. If you show at more than one regional show only your top point total will be doubled.

Regional junior shows are sometimes held in conjunction with existing shows so there definitely may be other show specific rules and regulations that apply. Please be aware of these additional requirements when making out your entries to these special shows.

In 2017 the New England, North Central and Great Plains Junior Shows will feature Dorset Advantage classes. The Great Lakes, New England, Eastern Regional Shows will also feature separate Horned Dorset classes. The All American Junior Show and the National Junior Dorset Shows in Louisville feature Polled Dorsets, Horned Dorsets and Dorset Advantage classes. There are also specific wether type classes in the Junior Polled and Horned Dorset Shows. The CDC is trying its best to promote all Dorset sheep that are being shown around the country for our junior breeders.

2017 DORSET EWE FUTURITY PROGRAM

To date we have had 67 polled ewe lambs nominated in the spring Dorset Sales, and 28 lambs are eligible to participate in this year's program as they were bought by junior buyers. In the horned dorset ewe lamb futurity, we have had 20 ewe lambs nominated and 6 head have been bought by junior owners. There has been 2 Dorset Advantage ewe lambs nominated and 1 have been bought for participation in their division. The yearling ewe program has 8 nominations by 8 different junior owners. We also encourage the purebred Dorset Wether Dam Ewe lambs to get nominated to participate in the futurity so junior owners will be able to get some return on their investments. Last year a wether type Polled Dorset ewe lamb won the polled ewe lamb division.

There are still a couple more consignment and online sales coming up in which a number of ewe lambs will be nominated for the futurity program in all categories. There is a lot of futurity money being offered for Polled Ewe Lamb, Horned Ewe Lamb and Dorset Advantage Ewe Lamb divisions so, we strongly encourage juniors to purchase these animal and participate in the program to earn premiums to offset your purchase price of a quality female for your breeding programs.

Thank-you to all of the Dorset breeders for nominating their ewe lambs! The overwhelming support by the Dorset breeders is the major reason why this program has become successful. Juniors are able to select from a large number of ewe lambs that will fit into both their breeding program and financial budget.

Online sales are also eligible to sell futurity nominated ewe lambs. We strongly encourage breeders to nominate their ewe lambs. To better keep track of animals being sold online a new online futurity nomination form has been designed and is available on the CDC web site. Some sale managements deduct the nomination fee, some don't so if this form could be filled out and sent into the CDC office it would assist in keeping track of animals nominated and assist in the nomination fee collection process.

For junior buyers, the program uses the scrapie tags as the permanent identification. If a lamb looses their original scrapie tag, notification must be made immediately to the CDC office before showing the lamb again for points. You are more than welcome to send by snail mail, fax forms into the office or scan forms and email to the CDC office. Good luck and get those point record forms in on time so we can apply all eligible points to your totals.

2017 SCHOLARSHIP APPLICATION AVAILABLE ON-LINE

The National Junior Dorset Association annually presents up to three \$1000 scholarships. To qualify, a student must be completing at least half of his or her college or technical school studies the year in which the application is made or be enrolled in graduate school.

These awards are available to current and previous members of the Continental Dorset Club Youth Enrollment Program or current lifetime members of the Continental Dorset Club. Applicants may be majoring or specializing in any type of field as these awards are not limited to agricultural majors.

The application must be postmarked **September 1, 2017.** Two letters of recommendation must be enclosed with the application. The individual completing the recommendation may return it to you in a sealed envelope, which has been signed over the flap. Send applications to:

YOUTH DORSET EWE PURCHASE GRANT PROGRAM

The National Junior Dorset Association and the CDC introduced a grant program for youth to use towards the purchase of a Dorset ewe. The associations awards three \$500 grants annually to be used towards the purchase of a registered Dorset female.

The purchase does not need to be done through a public consignment sale as on farm purchases are also eligible. The program is open to youth in three age divisions: Junior 8-10 years; Intermediate 11-14 years and Senior 15-18 years. An individual may win each division only one time. The applications are due December 1st of the current year. The winning applicants will receive their grant money upon the completed transfer of the ewe purchased into their names during the award year of the grant. Ewes purchased may be of any age or type of registered Dorset, but may not be purchased from a family member. A very simple one page application form is available memories. on the CDC website or you may contact the CDC office to foward you a copy.
